





**FACT** Despite well-documented poor and declining road conditions, the Governor proposes to spend LESS on transportation over the next two years.

A Legislative Fiscal Bureau analysis comparing the Governor's proposed transportation budget to the current biennium shows that the Governor's proposal would **REDUCE spending by \$45 million**.
